You can never tell what type of impact you may have on another's life by your actions..... or lack of action. That's what "Make A Difference "movie tells us and I believe it is true. The beauty of teaching lies in the fact that children forget what we taught or said but never forget how we made them feel. He would look for ways to talk again. One day, I thought that the best way to deal with him would be to allow him more time to share what he has to say. So I decided to give it a go. He said, "You know, this weekend I watched Barbie and three Musketeers. Have you ever watched it?" I said, "Yes I have watched it many times because my daughter loves Barbie movies". He said, "Though I am a boy I love to watch Barbie films. Is that OK?" I said that there's nothing wrong in that. To my surprise, he stopped disturbing the class with his weekend details and started reading his books with a lot of interest and would say that reading is fun. He learnt his sight words too. I observed that he disliked writing. I discovered that the reason could be the way he held pencil between his four fingers (as most Americans are taught). He found it difficult to write this way. I asked him if he would like to try the Indian way of holding the pencil. To my joy, he liked the new grip better and started writing words. He later said, "Writing is not that difficult."

Perhaps I brought a little change in the boy's life but the truth is that he brought in a greater change in me. I realised that no matter what subject we teach, the first thing we need to do is to connect with our students and build rapport with them. This will create a safe and conducive environment for teaching-learning.

One can never forget the high school memories. One such unforgettable incident is the change our Class Teacher brought in us. THE FIRST FEW HOURS AT EXCEL PUBLIC SCHOOL

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

TRAINING WHEELS

As iron sharpens iron, one man sharpens another"

EZ Vidya, Chennai has tied up with Excel public School and has been providing ongoing training to teachers of EPS and has equipped the teachers with better teaching tools and techniques for enjoyable teaching-learning experience.

The EZ Vidya training took the teachers through an experiential cycle of observing, assessing, delivering and evaluating their own teaching. They reflected on their teaching style and experienced new approaches to learning through which they eventually adapted themselves to their students' specific needs.

This workshop helped them to understand how they, as teachers, can apply instructional tools meaningfully in teaching-learning activities. The brain-based learning helped the participants to get acquainted with the basic structure and functions of the brain with special emphasis on the teaching-learning context.

The focus on Creative Thinking, where the participants were guided to discover and understand the four aspects of creativity that is fluency, elaboration, originality and flexibility and Critical Thinking, where the participant teachers were made aware of the need to foster the questioning spirit in learners was very interesting.

The discussion on Multiple Intelligence assisted participants in redefining intelligence and arriving at a comprehensive teaching-learning approach that recognizes and nurtures the intelligence of children in diverse domains. Teaching for understanding was introduced in this session and the participants were encouraged to realize the importance of backward design.

The CCE session which is the Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation for CBSE schools,

oriented the participants to the WHAT and WHY of CCE, it focused on HOW this process can be effectively applied to achieve its objective and it covered the methods of assessment and designing of rubrics for the evaluation procedure. The session concluded on fine tuning the assessment and evaluation tools. This training imparted a more focused approach to the whole system of evaluation by making the teachers understand the need for such evaluation, select relevant evaluation tools, and design relevant rubrics.
